Good Governance and Poverty Alleviation

The Programme

Rapidly developing and industrializing countries throughout the world pose a challenge for their national, provincial and local leaders and development managers to keep pace with the provision of adequate public services and address poverty alleviation.

While lack of funds is often discussed as the main constraint for the poor state of public services, international experience suggests that more often than not, lack of effective leadership, planning, management and capacity to mobilize resources, formulate and implement good projects are the main contributing factors; in mobilizing financial and managerial resources to implement projects, build institutional capacity and play a significant role in provision and delivery of public services. This programme focuses on these factors and examines the lessons learnt in the countries to be visited.

Countries to be visited:

Thailand:

Is a constitutional monarchy with a parliamentary system, and its economy is driven by tourism, agriculture, and manufacturing. According to the World Bank, over the last four decades. Thailand has made remarkable progress in social and economic development, moving from a low income to upper middle income country in less than a generation. As such Thailand has been a widely cited development success story with sustained growth and impressive poverty reduction. Thailand provides an excellent setting from which to learn. Many past participants have used in expensive shopping in Bangkok and done high standard in expensive health check up.

Dubai:

Is one of the seven United Arab Emirates (UAE). It is the most populous city in the UAE and has transformed from a small fishing village and pearling center to a regional transport and tourism center for the Middle East. Dubai has grown into the most progressive and modern city in the region. The massive growth of Dubai in the recent decades provides ample opportunity to learn from; the processes and cause of success will be examined. In this pogramme other emirates like Abu Dhabi will be visited for comparison and analysis. Dubai also provides good opportunity for shopping.

New Zealand:

Will provide an excellent opportunity for the participants to study the country's experience in good governance specially public sector reforms to improve delivery of public services. Governed as a unitary parliamentary democracy New Zealand's key industries are agriculture, tourism, and manufacturing. It is celebrated for its unique biodiversity, rich Māori heritage, and progressive social policies, including being the first country to grant women the right to vote in 1893. The visit will mainly concentrate on the development activities and good practices in and around Auckland city relevant to the objectives of the programmes.

Australia:

Is the world's sixth-largest country by total area and is a diverse and vibrant nation. Governed as a federal parliamentary democracy, Australia's economy is driven by mining, agriculture, and services sectors. Australia has had in excess of three decades of unprecedented economic growth and offers lessons to be learnt from its good governance specially social security and poverty alleviation programmes, effective delivery of services and high quality infrastructure in urban and regional settings. This program will be held in the Queensland cities of Brisbane and Gold Coast.

Source of Funding

Applicants and their departments should find their own sources of funding, either from their governments or through funding agencies such as bilateral or multilateral agencies. Kindly note that 90% of our participants are funded by their own governments or departments. The other 10% have received sponsorship from international agencies. In the past, funding agencies such as UNDP, World Bank, DFID, CIDA, SIDA, AUSAID, GTZ and ADB have sponsored some participants. The success in securing sponsorship depends on your own working relationship with these agencies. It should be noted that obtaining sponsorship is competitive and applicants should therefore apply to more than one agency and follow up properly in order to increase their chances of being successful.
